CALLING ALL LUDLOW BUILDERS

SWIFTS NEED YOUR HELP



For hundreds of years swifts have been returning to Ludlow each May to raise young before leaving at the end of July for the long trip back to Africa.

They have a distinctive scythe shape and on warm summer evenings scream around the roof tops.



Swifts like to nest in old buildings and Ludlow has always had plenty for them to use.

They need to be able to get into the eaves of a building to build a small nest on the wall plate.

They are not messy birds – the nests are small, clean and usually hidden from sight.

Swifts lay 2 or 3 eggs and when the young are able to fly they leave the nest and do not land again until they are ready to breed in 2 or 3 year's time. The birds are only here for a few weeks and only have time to rear 1 brood of chicks – so success is essential if they are to thrive.

There are significant dangers in flying this far to breed and **numbers have declined by over 50%** in the last decade – mainly because the refurbishment or demolition of historic buildings often destroys their nest sites.

Building to modern standards with **sealed roofs and walls leave no space for swifts** and scaffolding can prevent
nesting birds reaching their nests.

PVC soffits and cladding are a particular hazard, as are some insulation materials, but simple modifications can be made to allow swifts and bats access. **Please ask us for advice.**

Ludlow has some good natural nesting sites and we all need to work to ensure that these are not destroyed when properties are renovated – which is where **we are asking for your help**.

There are a number of options that will not damage the properties, old or new, and will bring a great deal of joy to the house owners as well.

Below are a number of ideas that come from builders all over the UK and Europe and can be used if holes in eaves absolutely have to be blocked. However existing **nest sites should not be**destroyed especially as these birds are protected by the Wildlife and Countryside Act!
